How can you make your community more playful?

It Forward!

Engage children in the planning and design of outdoor spaces. Children can articulate their preferences if given a meaningful opportunity to participate. This should be more than just choosing the colors of the equipment. Allow children to lay out pathways, develop a theme, learn about and pick plants.

Keep it natural. Structured play equipment has a role in play and can still provide exciting play opportunities when combined and intertwined with pathways, planting areas, seating nodes, berms, and vegetation. Trees provide opportunities for play and also welcomed shade on hot days. Where mature trees cannot be maintained or don't exist, consider other opportunities for shade such as shelters and canopies.
